BUILD BUT BUILD GREEN

The Council's Local Plan includes proposals for more large—scale housing developments for North Norfolk, including a massive expansion of new houses on the western fringe of North Walsham. This is despite growing concern about the environmental impact of such developments.

North Norfolk Greens believe that it's time to change the way we think about housing. For too long new house—building has been profit—driven rather than focussing on meeting local people's affordable housing needs.

Where new houses are essential to meet real local needs, we will call on the Government and developers to

minimise the embodied carbon in the construction process, by exploring alternatives to concrete, steel and other carbon—intensive materials, and by reducing emissions from the transportation of materials to and from the site, the machinery used on site, and the disposal of waste. Greater consideration too must be given to operational carbon emissions of the buildings, their energy efficiency, water demand, and the potential for increased discharge of sewage into rivers and seas.

We shall continue to hold the Government at the national and local level to account on this issue.

WE CAN BUILD WARMER!

Britain's buildings leak warmth because they are poorly insulated, and they emit huge amounts of carbon when they are heated by fossil fuel boilers or electric heating that does not come entirely from renewable sources. The Government has started to put some measures into the Building Regulations and has a scheme for boiler replacement but nothing like enough or at a scale to meet the problem.

However, even if these things were tackled better there is still an elephant in the room; the truly massive amount of CO2 generated by constructing our buildings in the first place. Parliament's Environmental Audit Committee (EAC) published an excellent report last June, 'Growing back better: putting nature and net zero at the heart of the economic recovery', which recommended introducing

embodied carbon targets for the construction of new homes. The Government did not respond to this recommendation.

Our North Norfolk MP, Duncan Baker, is a member of the EAC and he has tabled a Bill to deal with this. The Bill was presented on 2 February and you can follow progress through the Parliament website. Duncan says "our buildings and construction [emit] over 150m tonnes of greenhouse gases per year...and there is no regulation of the embodied carbon in the materials used to construct them. I am looking to bring in legislation that will enable the industry to have a clear requirement to measure, report, and reduce against aligned targets of embodied carbon as we race to reach our net zero targets". This will be an important measure and we wish Duncan every success in seeing it through.

ENTANGLED LIFE Merlin Sheldrake

This wonderful book introduces us to the extraordinary world of fungi and their importance in the planet we inhabit. Beautifully written, it includes some hard science



and some amazing stories that show how all of us in the biosphere are, literally, connected.

EARTH IS OUR BUSINESS Polly Higgins

The late Polly Higgins campaigned tirelessly for Ecocide to be made a Crime against Peace, as are Genocide, War Crimes, Crimes against Humanity, and Crimes of Aggression. This is her second book and it details the case. I found some of the legal processes difficult to follow, but the overall argument is overwhelming, and should be irrefutable. I now want to read her last book, DARE TO BE GREAT, published posthumously in 2020.

DANCING WITH BEES Brigit Strawbridge Howard

A delightful book, written with love for bees and their place in our lives, and our place in theirs. It is a personal story about the author teaching herself about bees, and more, and it has some astute observations, biological facts, and, above all, it is positive, life-affirming, and a joy to read.

TIPS AND IDEAS

- Buy washing powder in boxes, ideally the concentrated kind.
- Buy dishwasher powder in boxes or tablets that are not wrapped in plastic.
- Buy soap bars that are not in plastic, it's not just fancy hand crafted soap that are wrapped in card!
- Buy loose fruit and vegetables and use your own bags or none at all!
- Try and chose foods sold in boxes or tins.
- Think about the next generation; have fun making biscuits with kids, as it is hard to find biscuits not wrapped in plastic.
- Look at the labels on clothes to spot fabric made from fossil fuels like polyester, acrylic and nylon. Go for bamboo, viscose, rayon and best of all, wool or cotton
- Buy pet food in boxes and tins.
- Accept we cannot be perfect and being plastic-free is very hard Do what you can, and be kind to yourself.
